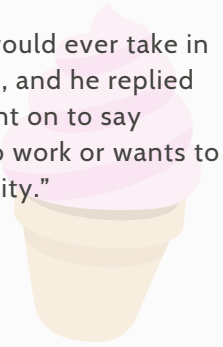


Justin R: Do you like your working environment?

CPR/FIRST AID CLASS

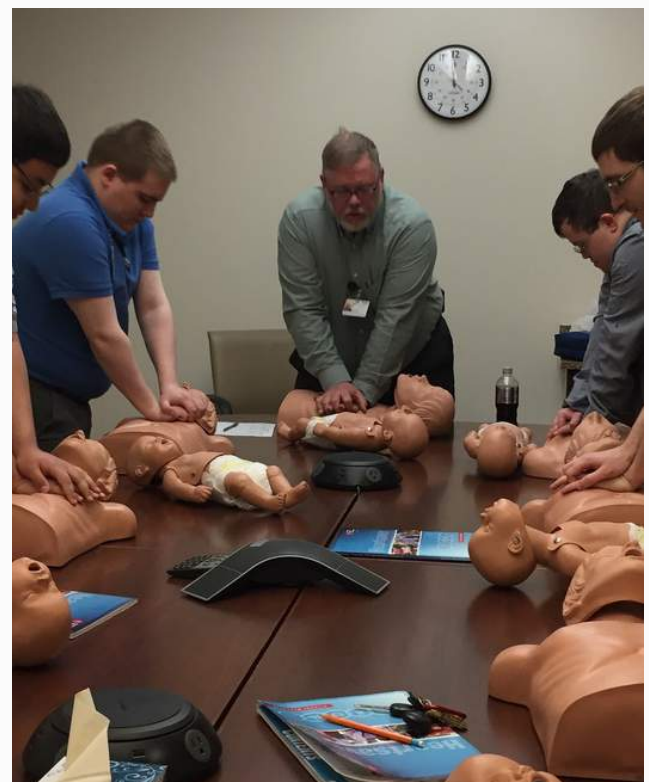

Project SEARCH Interns recently became certified in First Aid and CPR. Interns learned how to perform the Heimlich maneuver on someone who is choking, and learned what to do when someone comes in contact with hazardous chemicals. It is important to call for help if things get out of control.

CPR is used when a person is not responding. Interns learned to check for breathing, call for help and do compression's until help arrives, or until the person starts breathing again.

In our First Aid training, we learned how to assist with multiple situations and injuries. For example hazardous spills on the skin, tooth injuries, or someone in shock. Interns also learned to suppress bleeding and learned how to clean various wounds.

By using an AED along with CPR you can increase the chance to save a person's life. In order to do that, you need to locate the AED. Did you know that there's an app for that? It's called Pulse-Point AED, this app can help you locate the nearest AED, which can be found almost everywhere. Overall, this can help you save a life.





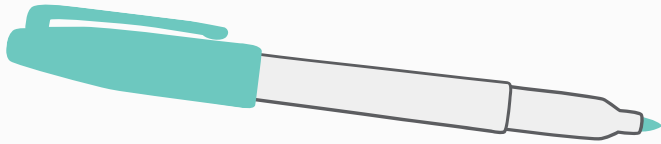
APPLICATIONS & INTERVIEWING

In order to get a job, there are two things that everybody needs to know how to do. Filling out the application for the job you are applying for and going to the interview. The application is the first thing an employer sees; it describes your past work experience, then your education. Next is a set of skills (make sure that the skills that you are listing will apply to the job your seeking). Finally always list your contact information, phone number, email, and address.

After the application is sent and you have been notified that the employer is interested they will set-up an interview. Wear clothes that relate to the job you are applying for, a nice dress shirt and pants are most preferable and the safest bet. When the interviewer asks a question use the STAR method (situation, task, analysis, and result).

Remember the rule of threes, if a question like “describe yourself” is asked give three examples, it could look bad if your carry on a topic for too long, keep it short and simple. Writing down your answers on a piece of paper, can actually show the interviewer that you took the time to be prepared.
